## **WORKSHOPS**

### **How to create a pharmacy service - Daniel Sabater (Spain), Marcel Bouvy (The Netherlands), Mitja Kos (Slovenia)**

In this workshop we will develop a pharmacy service in the field of cardiovascular risk management. The workshop elaborates on how pharmacists can intervene in an efficient way and how to collaborate with physicians and nurses. Topics that will be discussed are planning and running the service, monitoring and evaluation the outcomes of the intervention including economic outcomes. Participants will do group work on case studies.

### **How to become a prescribing Pharmacists - Derek Stewart (Scotland)**

Pharmacists in Scotland have taken up independent prescribing at an astonishingly high rate over the past years. In this workshop we will elaborate on how pharmacists can evolve to becoming independent prescribers. Topics of the workshop will be how to change the attitude of pharmacists and doctors and how to train pharmacists.

### **How to convince the doctor – Peter Hartingsveld and Josephine Stutterheim (The Netherlands)**

To have a positive impact on patient outcomes achieved with pharmacotherapy, pharmacists need to collaborate more closely with physicians. Several studies suggest that only a proportion of pharmacotherapy recommendations made by pharmacists to physicians are implemented. In general, poor pharmacist-physician communication leads to medication errors that can even result in death or permanent loss of function for a patient. Therefore, there is a need to improve pharmacist-physician communication. In this workshop we will analyze several clinical patient cases focusing on effective communication with a physician.

#### **Learning Objectives**

1. After the workshop, participants should be able to identify drug therapy problems which are clinically relevant;
2. The participant learn about a tool to document drug therapy problems from a patient and physician perspective;
3. The participant learn about a tool to improve communication about drug therapy problems and implementation of recommendations with the physician.
